

Meet Librarian Jess Roesch



Jess Roesch grew up in Ventura
County in Southern California,
studied at the University of Redlands
in Redlands, CA, and then, like
many Marin librarians, got her M.A.
in Library Information and Science at
San Jose State University. She is
part of the linked chain of local
librarians who studied at San Jose
State, where Jess says, "It's really
nice to know people and get new
ideas."

And ideas are a specialty.
Innovations since Jess started
working at the Larkspur Library (her
first public library job!) include
arranging for puzzles and games to
be available for checkout for card
holders; starting a seed library;
creating unique crafts programs



(mosaic design class, for instance); and starting the Book Spotlight, "a nook at the library where lesser-

known titles and undiscovered authors are featured."

Before the Larkspur Library, Jess worked at Book Passage and Barnes and Noble. Books are, she says "my favorite topic. I will normally read about 50 per year." Recent favorites include Lessons in Chemistry (she hasn't seen the TV show yet but plans to) and Remarkably Bright Creatures ("a woman and an octopus story, with characters you can really root for and a bittersweet ending").

The *House in the Cerulean Sea* is an all-time favorite. She says she also reads YA books, and among her favorites are books by author Stephanie Garber and the Caraval series.

Jess's father was a Foley artist at Warner Brothers, then retired last year at Lucas Films (Wikipedia defining Foley artists' work: "the reproduction of everyday sound effects that are added to films, videos, and other media in post-production to enhance audio quality."). "I watched him live his dreams. I wanted to take him as an example and find something I really loved, to have that joy in my life."

A friend who knew about Jess's love for books suggested she become a librarian, and her first library job is at the Larkspur Library. "I love the community, love our regulars. Larkspur is unique because the library feels like a home. I get to talk to all our regulars about their lives, share stories with them, and bring the joy of books to the community. It is so exciting to look forward to a new library and all the services we will be able to offer there."

Jess and Stefan Dolan, her fiancé of eight years, plan to marry this spring and honeymoon in Italy, a busman's holiday of sorts, as Stefan is sous-chef at SPQR, a San Francisco Michelinstarred Italian restaurant, and plans to explore Italian food. The couple met in Portland, where he was a chef at Departure. She moved to Portland with a friend after college for a year to experience a new state and city. "I loved Portland for the people, the food, and the beautiful environment, but ultimately found that my California heart prefers the weather here!

"Stefan is very talented, and I really believe in him," she says. Among his specialties: gnocchi, harissa and carrots, and ramen. Jess has ideas (of course) about food-related library activities. Recipe swaps? Cooking demonstrations? "I have lots of ideas," she says.

Ideas and optimism. Says Jess, "I believe every year will be the best year, and they all are!"

New Library Project Update

WE HAVE A WINNER! Congratulations to Alten Construction and Noll & Tam.

As we wrap up another year in our campaign for a new Larkspur Library at The Commons, we're thrilled to share that Alten Construction, Inc. (ACI), in partnership with Noll & Tam Architects, was chosen to design and build the new library. The announcement was made during the December 13 Larkspur City Council meeting.

Among the three finalists, ACI's submission was recognized by the Request for Proposal (RFP) scoring team as the best value proposal. City Manager Dan Schwarz is now authorized to negotiate final terms with ACI for a design-build contract, which will later be presented to the City Council for approval, including necessary budget amendments.





ACI and the Noll & Tam team have submitted sketches of a proposed building, but these are not necessarily final representations of the architecture. Per the specifications of the RFP, the sum for the design-build of the library and community space is \$12,765,000. Construction of the new library will begin in 2024 and must be completed by the end of 2025.

Since 1995, Robert (Bob) Alten's company has constructed and modernized over 100 facilities across the San Francisco Bay Area, including K-12 public schools, universities, community colleges, city halls, courtrooms, and libraries.

provided the photo and some interesting background information about her late mother's passion for reading:

Elda Maria Phillips' love of reading and public libraries was lifelong: from perfecting her English through books checked out from New York City libraries after emigrating to the US from Havana, Cuba at age 13, to serving on the Board of the Washington, D.C. Public Library System after years of teaching Spanish literature at the university level.



With three children and eight grandchildren all living in Larkspur, Elda moved to Marin County with her husband Richard in 2000. The Commons Foundation mission to raise funds to build a new Larkspur Library couldn't be a more perfect way to honor Elda's memory. Elda passed away this past July, just two weeks shy of her 90th birthday.

Friends' Book Recommendations


Serena

This is Happiness by Niall Williams


My husband and I loved this book. We got it out of the library and then bought it as a keeper!

The anticipation of the arrival of electricity and how electrification transforms village life plays a key role in the novel. Irish music and love are also themes. The skill of the writer makes the everyday happenings so wonderful to read with lots of humor and also poignancy.

I am finishing up a terrific read: *The Whalebone Theatre*. Set in England before and through WWII, the novel follows the lives of three children who grow up together in a country mansion outside London and into their young adulthoods during wartime. Touching, endearing, original, also heart-breaking—the adventure begins with the children creating a theatre out of whale bones that wash up on the estate's beach, and the themes of theater and creative endeavor wind through the novel. 

(J.K. Rowling's *nom de mystere*)



I have just finished reading (for the second time)


Plainsong, a masterpiece of people and place and simile

and metaphor — it reads like poetry and wisdom. It


belongs in a list that includes Ivan Doig (another of my


experiences as a daughter, wife, friend, and writer. These are moving essays that make one look at their own life with fresh eyes.

by Prince Harry





Absolution

by Alice McDermott

Definition: absolution – forgiveness for a sinful act, release from consequences of guilt)

McDermott's book explores the lives of American wives of the engineers and businessmen sent early to Vietnam to prepare for the war and future relationships between the countries. Since the women have Vietnamese servants to cook and clean, they spend their days bathing, getting dressed, napping, shopping, and meeting together for



lunches to plan how to help the hospitalized and orphaned Vietnamese children.



To raise money for toys and candy for these children, one wife recognizes that there's an American market among her friends for Vietnamese-styled clothing for Barbie dolls. She employs a skilled Vietnamese seamstress to make these garments, which they sell to buy treats for Vietnamese orphans and young children.

That altruistic impulse, trying to "do good" in a world where women have little agency or power – how effective is it? McDermott shares a perspective of benevolence we don't often consider about those suffering due to America's presence in Vietnam.
